During our stay in BC, Tricia was able to drive to Calgary, Alberta one weekend to see her family. Her youngest sister was out from Australia, so it was perfect timing. The Sunday Tricia was there, she stopped at Tim Hortons after church to grab a coffee. A lady came up to her in the parking lot and introduced herself as Sandra Harris. She gave a story about how she has been struggling and needed some money to pay for a hotel room. Instead of that, Tricia offered to buy her some food. Tricia came to the Lord partly because of a chance meeting like this and was well aware of the impact such an encounter could have. Before giving Sandra the sandwich, Tricia told her that she was doing this because she was a Christian. Sandra was surprised and said that all those who had helped her since she had fallen on hard times had also been Christians. Tricia was then able to use this opportunity to share her testimony and give a clear gospel presentation. Sandra said she had recently come to believe there was a God, that He was trying to get her attention and that she didn't believe their meeting was by chance. URUGUAYAN HAPPENINGS

We were excited when Patricio brought his mom to church the first Sunday of the year. Since his salvation in September, he has had a real burden to see his family saved. The Lord has recently opened a door for Tricia and I to establish a relationship with both his parents and his brother. We are looking forward to what the Lord will do in and through this family. Patricio and Candela continue to grow in the Lord and are still doing weekly Bible studies with me via Zoom as we travel.

Álvaro used to be very faithful to church but has fallen off since the pandemic. He loves the Lord and loves his Word, but the cares of this world have captured his heart. During our move, Álvaro helped out as did Patricio. The two men talked quite a bit that day and have kept in touch since. One night during dinner at his house, Álvaro told us how Patricio told him he had heard Álvaro loved the Lord but didn't attend services often; he wondered why. Apparently this convicted Álvaro and he's been back in church ever since. We pray that this friendship with a zealous new believer will continue to encourage Álvaro in his walk with God. We've known for a long time that the Lord wants to use Álvaro and his godly wife, Anita, but he seems afraid of what surrender might mean and is resisting the call.

Unfortunately, right before we left for furlough, we had to have a disciplinary meeting with one of our members. "T" has been coming to church for the last few years, but one behaviour has been causing disunity among the brethren and offending new people who attend. With much prayer, Daniel and I went and spoke with "T". It was a difficult but necessary meeting and God was with us in the conversation. Since that time, "T" has decided to stop coming to church, but we are praying that the Lord will work in their heart and that restoration will occur.

After prayer and consultation with our sending church pastor, Daniel was licensed to preach and was accepted by the church as my assistant. When we asked them to pray about him taking the position, Daniel's wife Gabriela was in full support:"He's already been fulfilling these duties over the last few years, so the title is only a formality". This was true. We praise the Lord for willing servants in the work of the Lord. As far as Baptists in Uruguay go, it has always been difficult to get nationals to take leadership positions so this is a rarity. Please pray for Daniel and Gabriela as they lead and that the Lord would continue to strengthen and grow His church. Prayers for wisdom and direction for Tricia and I would also be appreciated. Iglesia Bautista Fundamental is becoming indigenous and we're asking the Lord to show us what role in the church He has for us upon our return.

God has graciously given me the opportunity to teach another online Spanish Bible college course in April. This time it will be on soteriology (the doctrine of salvation). Please pray that it will be at least as fruitful as the one I taught last year. Last time, there were students from 12 different countries in Latin America (including Uruguay), the USA and Europe so I am well aware of the potential for spiritual influence this course could have.
